They advised that it appeared two wires touched, due to the high wind, and one broke causing the fire. Please stay vigilant during the upcoming dry season, and take all precautions while flying, to stay clear of the power lines.

I look forward to seeing as many people as I can at the field and look forward to enjoying our great club until we move.

Many of you have likely seen me at the flying field wearing a shirt emblazoned with the logo of the Eighth Air Force. I do this in tribute to my father, S/Sgt. Richard W. Hirsch who, like so many others, enlisted to serve at the age of 18 in order to stop Hitler's reign of terror on the people of Europe. Following a basic training stint in Texas and then some time at the Army gunnery school in Las Vegas, Dad was assigned as a U.S. Army Air Corps tail gunner on a B-17 with the 452nd Bomb Group, Squadron 729. The 452nd, based at Deopham Green (near Norwich, England) was one of countless American air bases scattered throughout England in 1943-44. The 452nd were identified with a "Square L" insignia painted on the tail. Flying aboard a B-17 (G) was extremely difficult, as the missions could sometimes last 12-14 hours, and the planes were cramped and uncomfortable. The crews had to take extra precautions against the bitter cold and lack of oxygen at 30,000 ft, and the constant danger from German warplanes and flak took its toll on the bombers and on the men. Of nearly 13,000 B-17s ever built, a full one-third would be lost to combat over Germany. On Jan 17 1945, my dad was on his 16th mission, sent to bomb the submarine pens at Hamburg. Suddenly at 25,000 ft, their ship received a direct hit on the right wing from German 88 (flak) guns. The wing caught fire, and two more "near" hits took out a large section of their vertical fin. The plane began to shudder violently, with #3 and #4 motors out. Their plane was thrown up onto the left wing, and the bail out bell began to ring. Rapidly losing altitude, (pilot) 1st Lt Ed Halek struggled to right the plane, and at 14,000 ft was somehow able to regain control of the ship and the fire. At this point, they decided not to abandon the ship, and an order was given to salvo everything they could in order to try to make it to the North Sea. Still dropping, and already at a very low altitude, the shocked crewmen scrambled to the radio room to prepare as best they could for the inevitable. Halek, along with (co-pilot) 2nd Lt Harlan Adams wrestled the plane into a hard, wheels-up (belly) landing in a plowed field near Sittensen, Germany. No crewmen would be injured in the crash, but all were immediately captured by Serbian farm laborers, then quickly turned over to German forces, thus becoming some of the more than 28,000 U.S. airmen who would become POWs during the conflict. Initially sent to Stalag XIIID, Dad and his crew were soon moved to Stalag VIIA, near Moosburg. My dad never talked much about his time spent in the POW camps, but he told me that the airmen were not abused or mistreated - - their main problem was that nobody in camp ever got medical attention or had enough food to eat. At that later point in the war, the malnourished conditions began to affect their German captors as well. This led to a somewhat "humorous" occurrence. Toward the war's end (~Mar-Apr 1945) and with General Patton's Army making huge, liberating strides eastbound across Europe, the German guards became a little "less motivated" at their assigned watches. So, my dad and a buddy would sneak away from camp to forage the surrounding fields in search of additional food for themselves and for their campmates. It was during one of these scavenging treks that their captors at last decided to completely leave their posts; the camp was basically freed. Unfortunately, Dad and his pal returned to find that their camp was now completely empty and abandoned! As a result, they had to journey on their own back to the port of Le Havre in order to ship back to the states. To complete the circle of this story, my dad got safely back to U.S. soil on June 15 1945. Their wrecked plane, #43-38533, was also eventually returned to the U.S. and was scrapped around 1948 - - in Texas. Dad would spend his professional career in Public Health in the Los Angeles area, and he succumbed to lung cancer just short of his

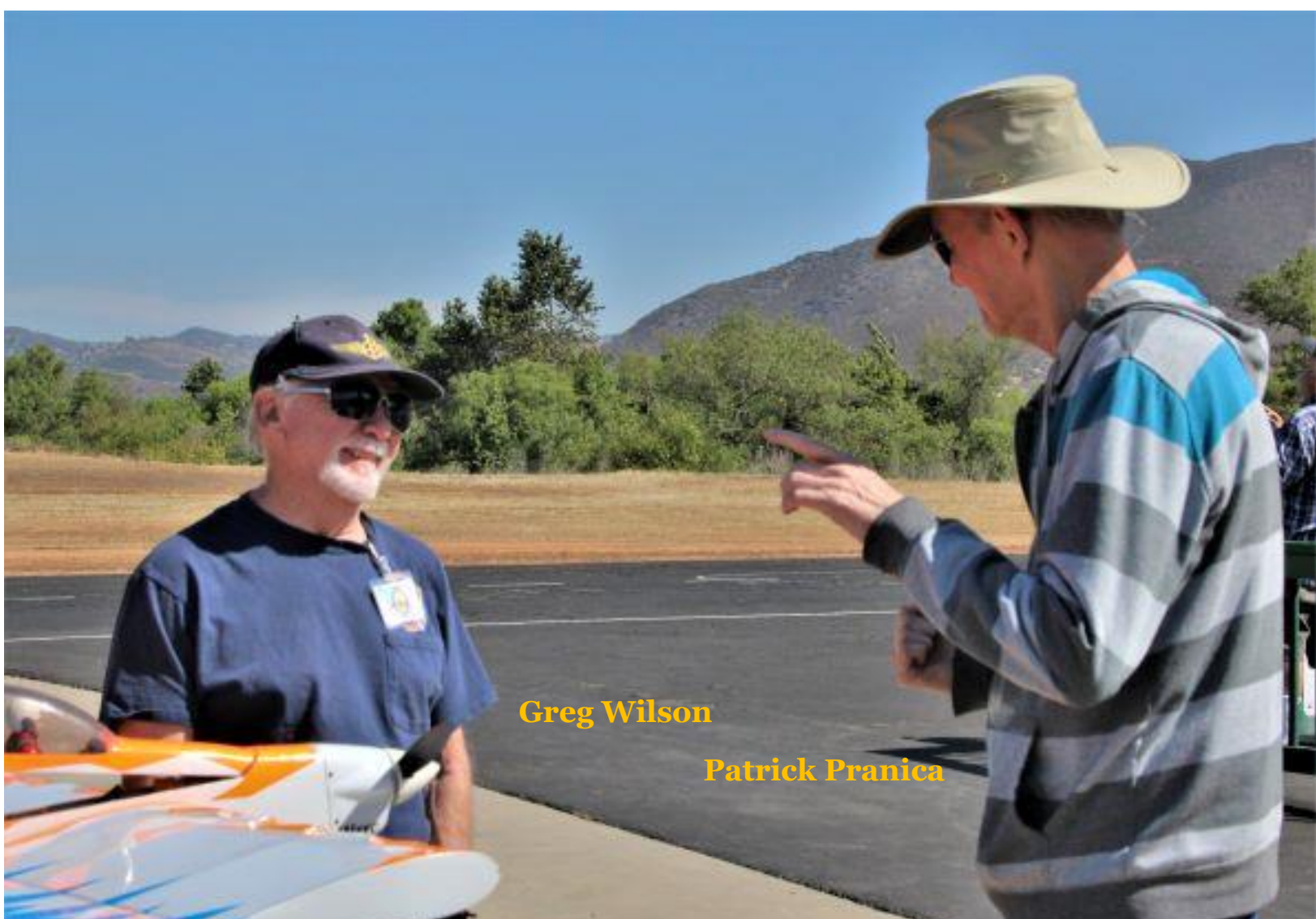

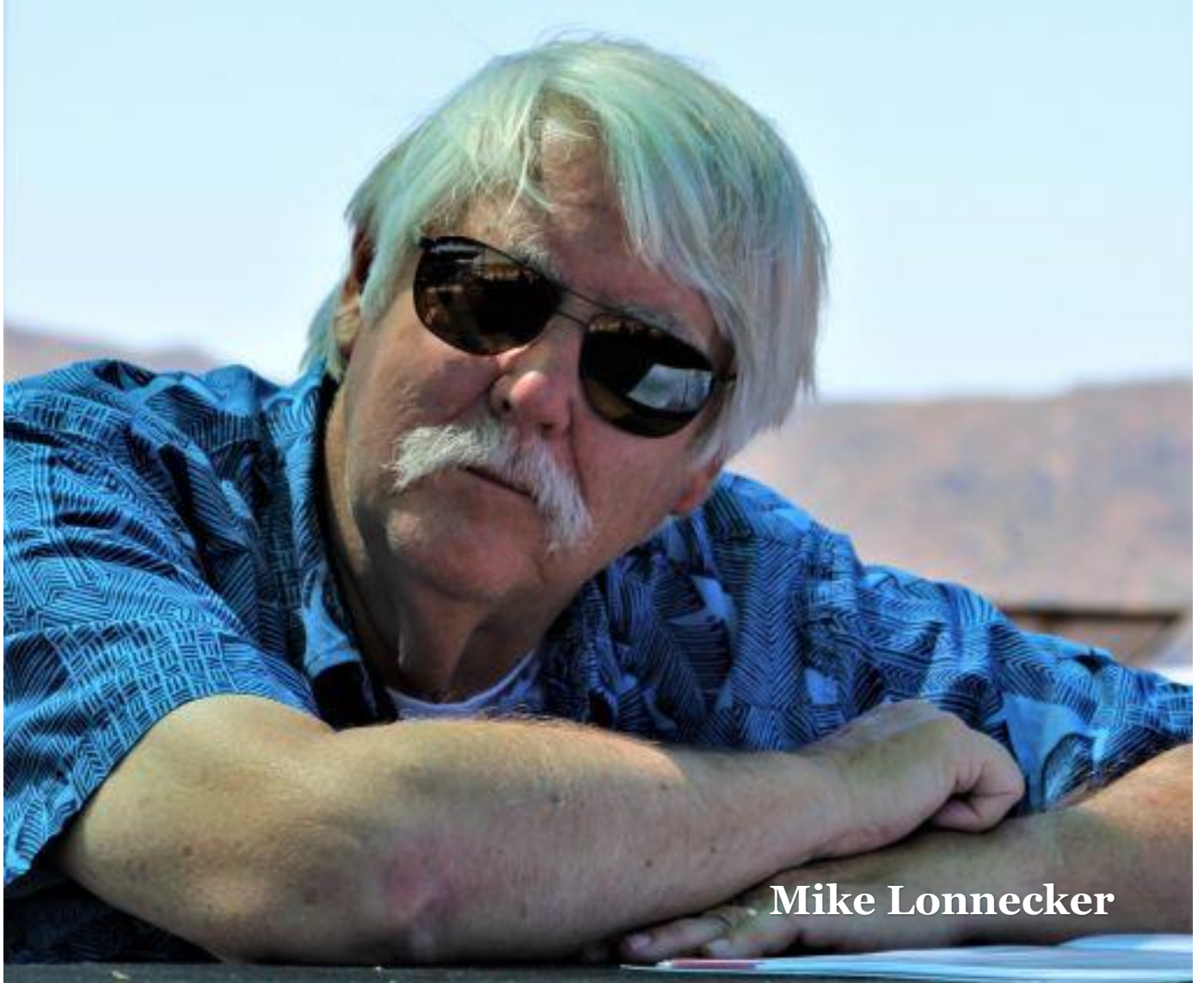

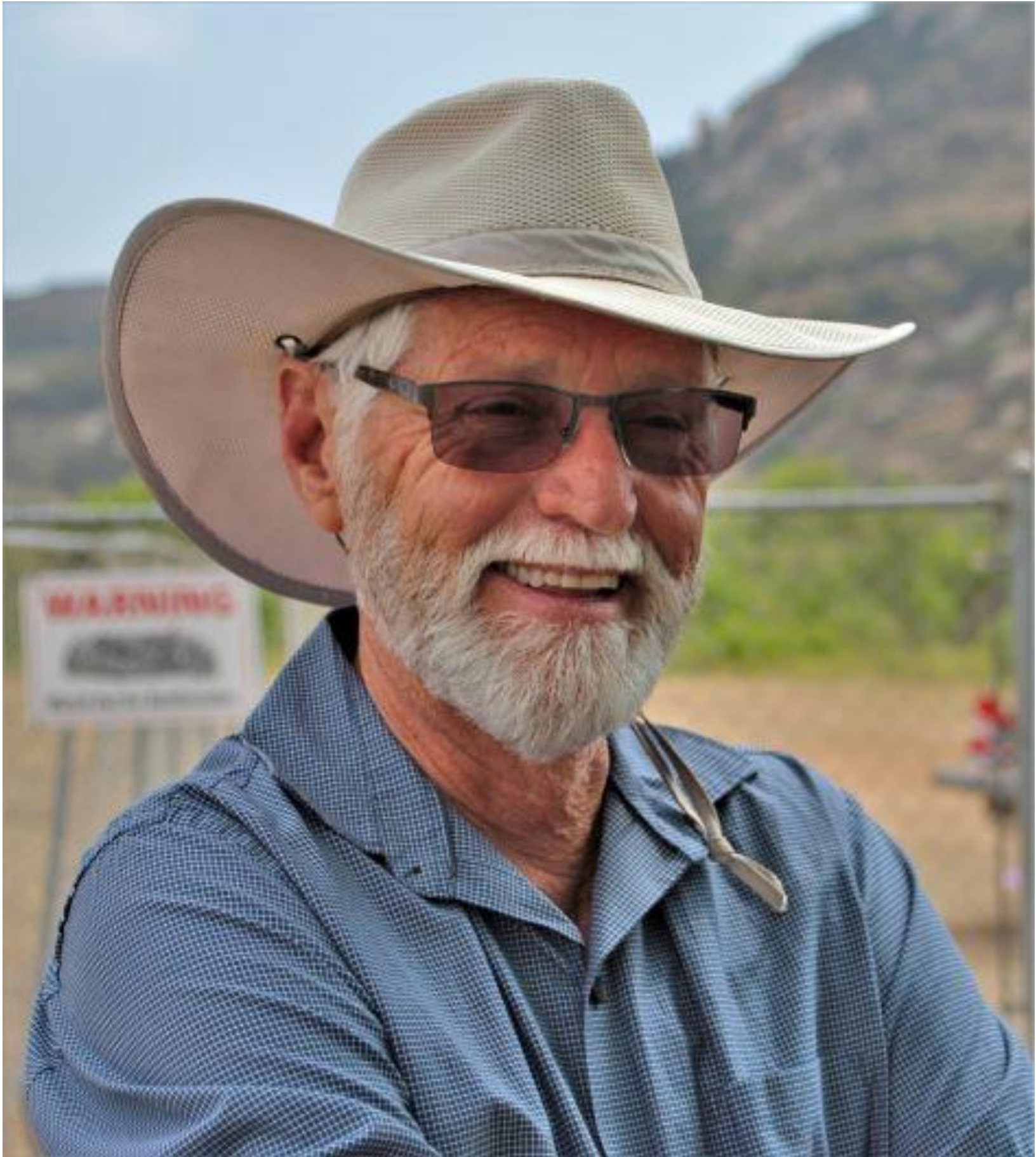

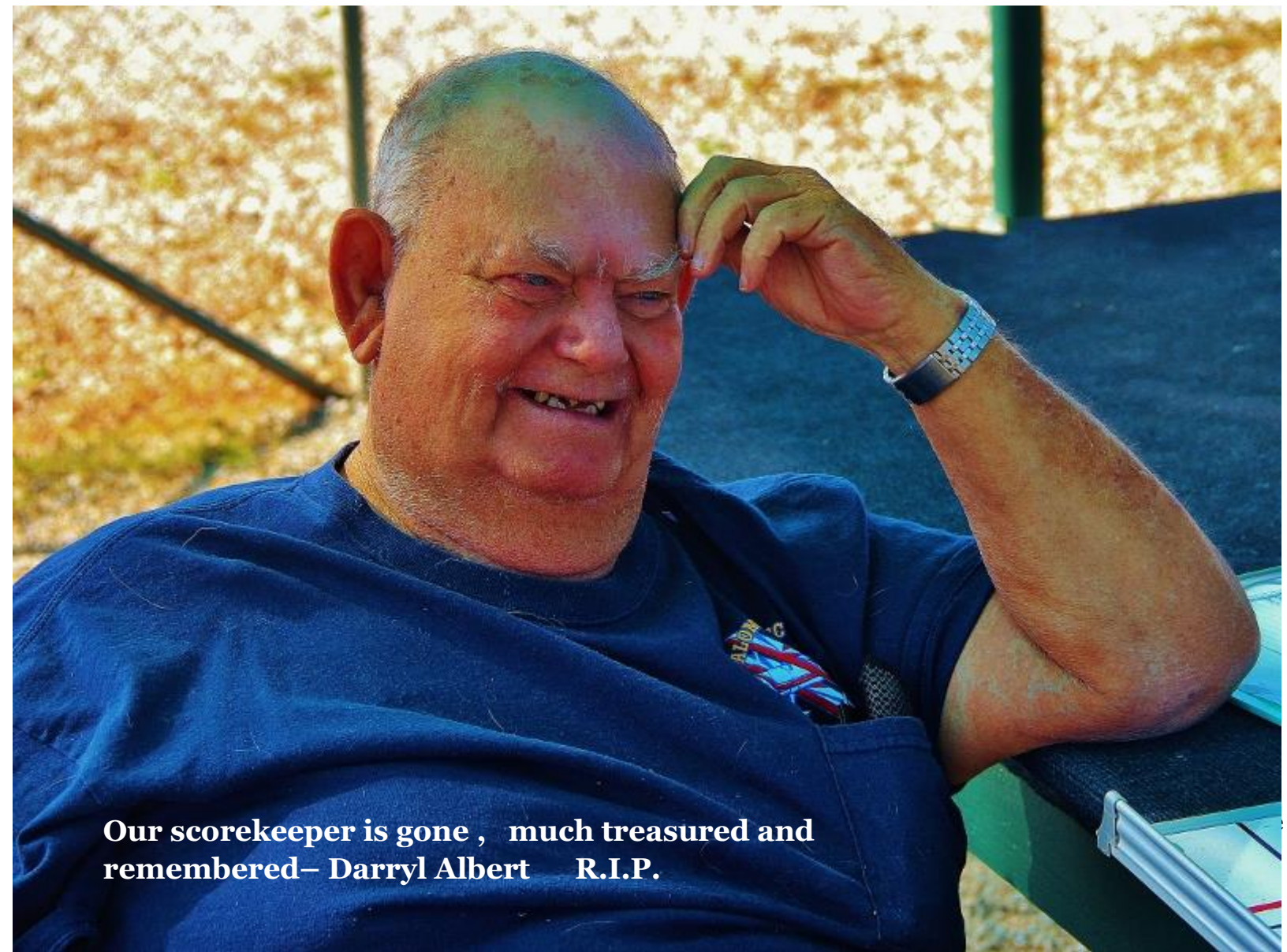

On Fri, May 7, 2021 at 9:35 PM Chris Thompson wrote:

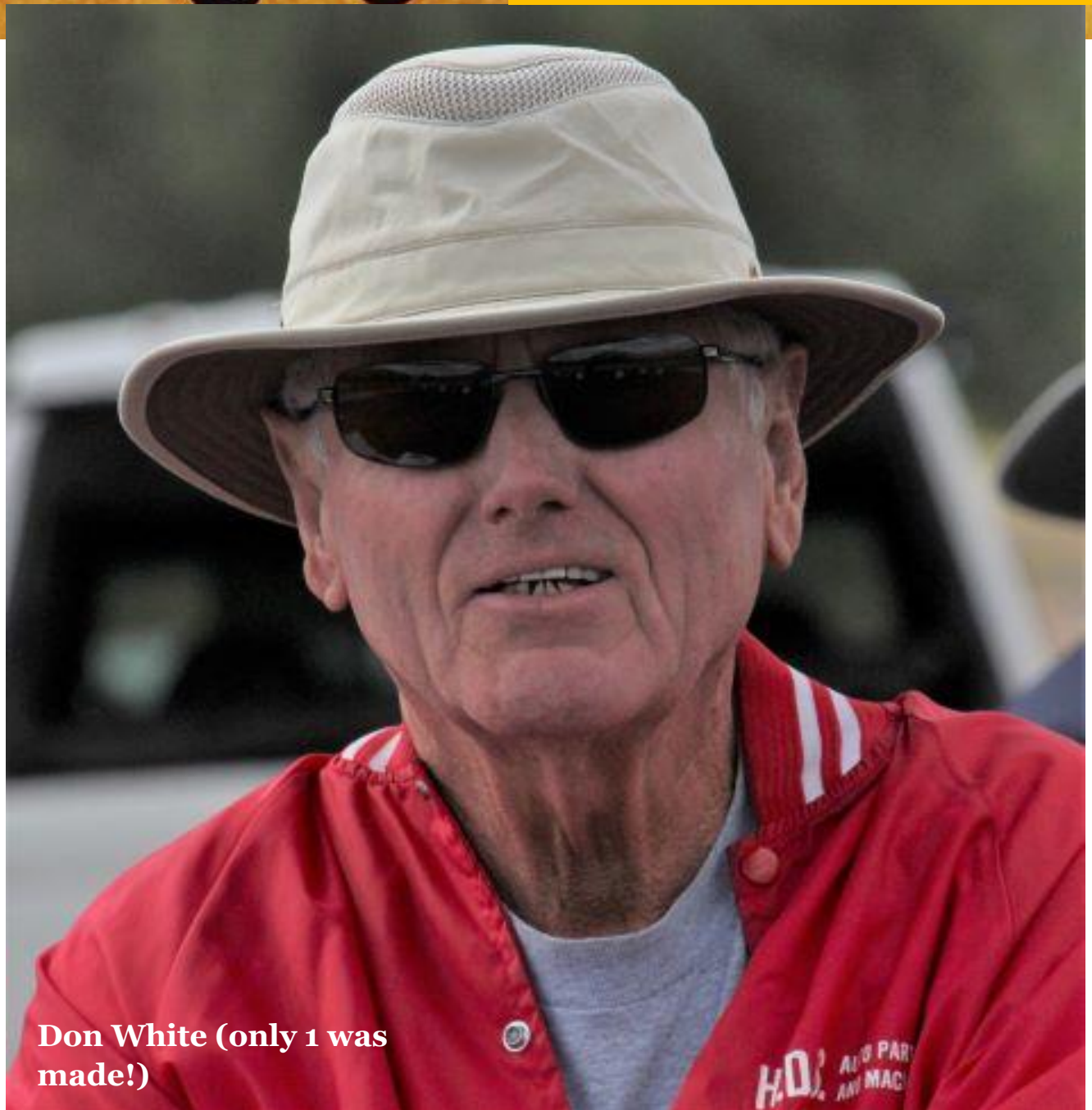

The SDGE foreman said the wind caused two lines to touch causing an arc and one wire broke.

Flight operations were suspended for a short time and resumed when the Fire crews left.

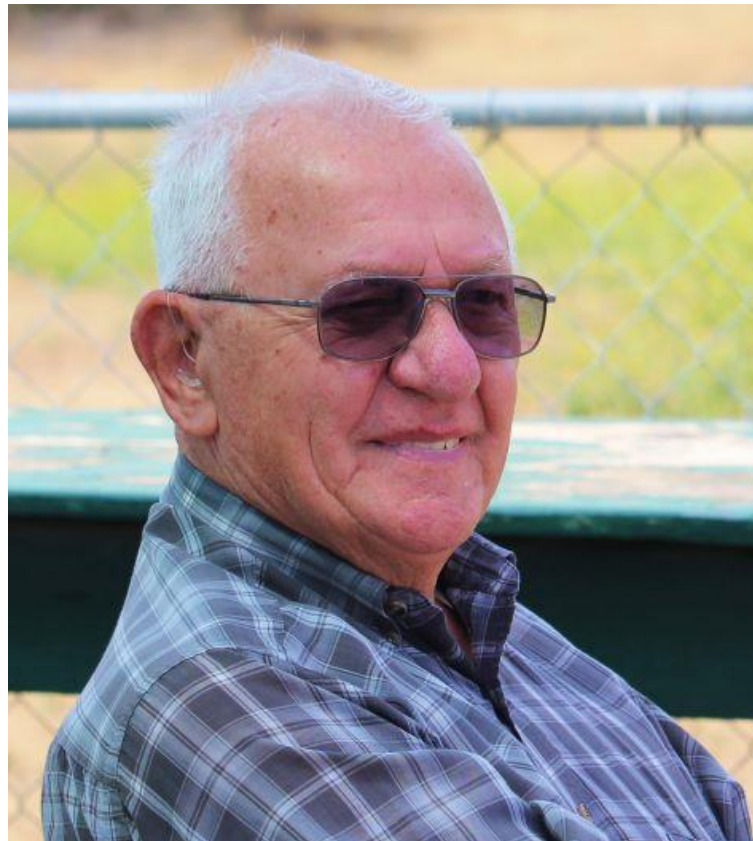
May 22, 2021 Monthly Club Meeting

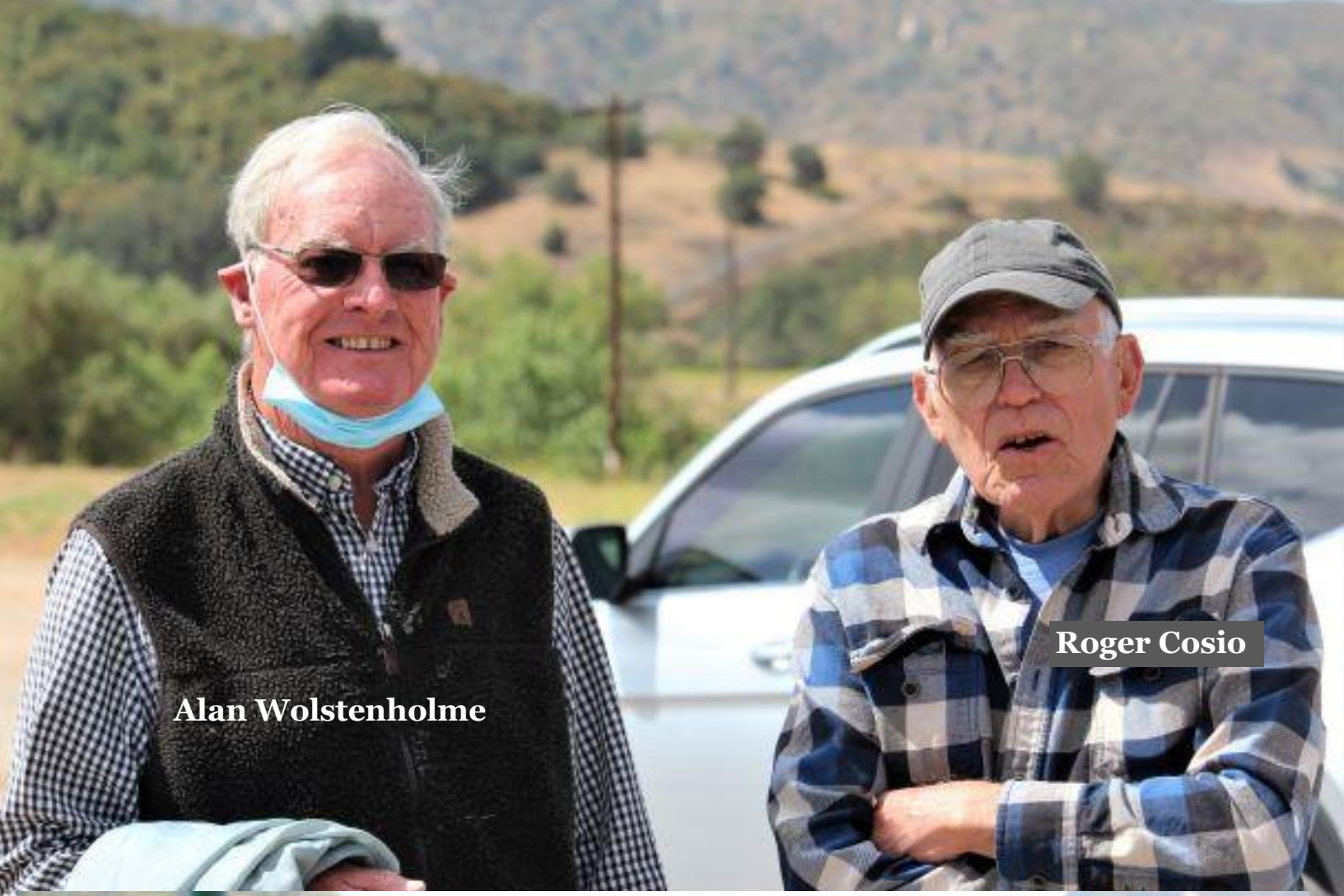

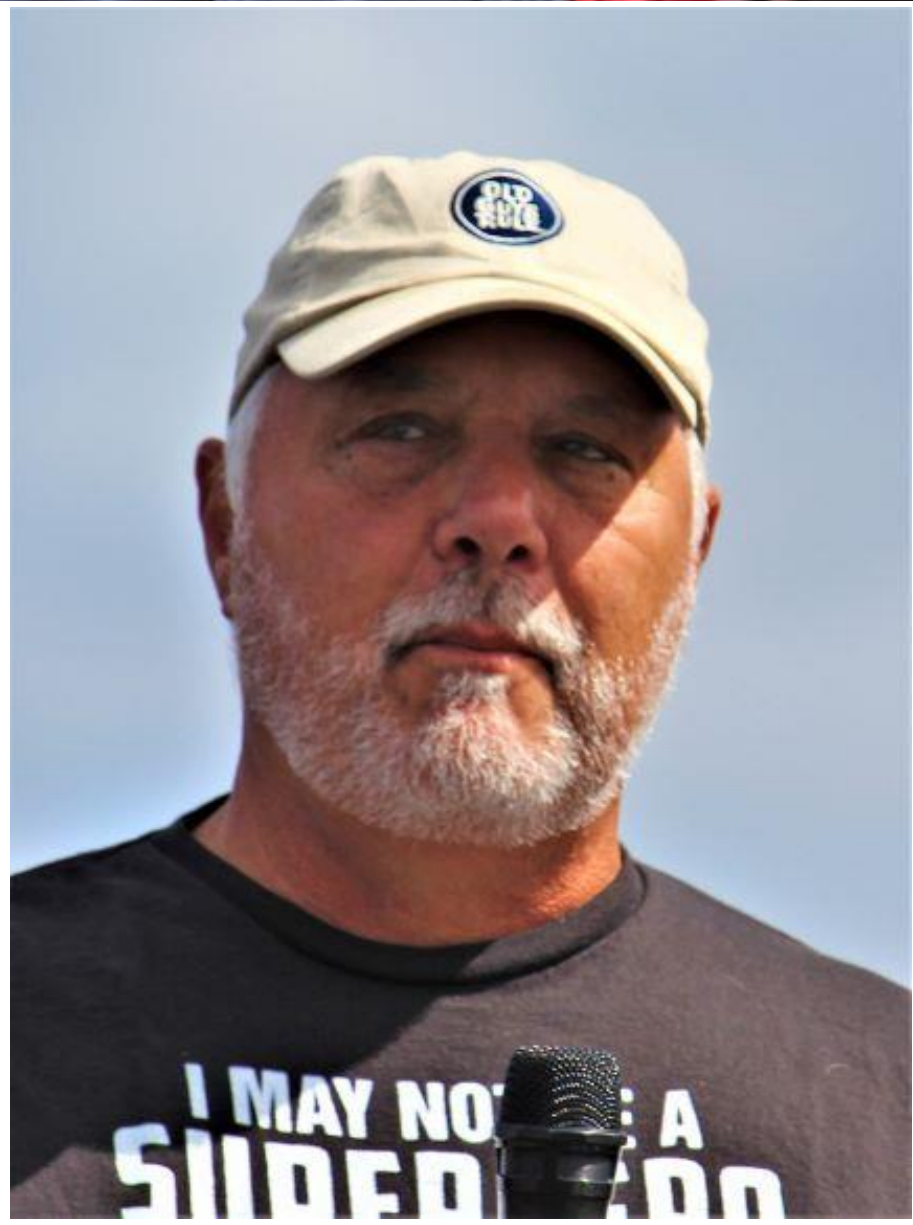

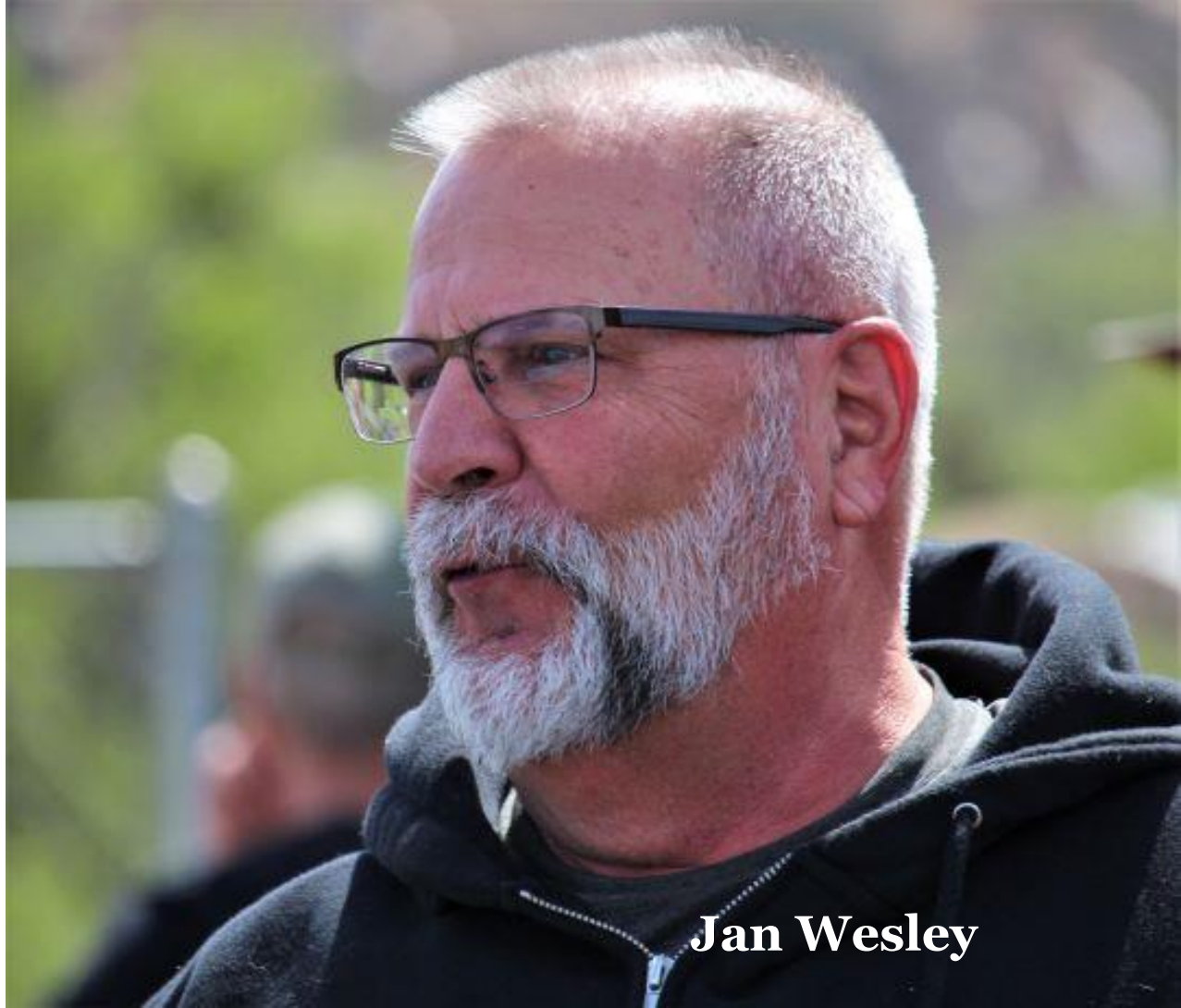




Pancho Castillo brought his Spitfire to show for model-of-the-month.
